40TH ANNIVERSARY MEETING ON HORIZON FOR FRIENDS

The Friends of the Valley Center Library will reach a remarkable moment in its history this Spring when the organization celebrates its 40th Annual Meeting.

Founded in 1978, the Friends has held an annual meeting each year over the past four decades to mark the progress of the all-volunteer group. A committee is currently considering events to celebrate the 40th anniversary meeting scheduled for Saturday, April 27, 2019. Options include a well-known guest speaker or an entertainment program.

Over the years, the annual meeting has featured famous authors, among them Ray Bradbury in 1990, to the 2016 premiere of a vintage silent film depicting Valley Center in the 1950's, with a pianist accompanying the film. Last year's meeting welcomed a full house for a trio of singers who captured the style and harmonies of the famed Andrews Sisters.

The Friends of the Valley Center Library held its first meeting on January 26, 1978, when 27 persons gathered to discuss fund-raising and the collection of local historic data. One month later, the grown new group had to 40 members. The following year, Articles of Incorporation were approved by the Secretary of State and the Friends had grown to 88 members. By 1981, the number reached 151. The IRS later

declared the Friends as a tax-exempt non-profit organization.

President Marian Klein will preside at the meeting for the final time, stepping down after leading the ever-growing organization for seven years.

JANUARY 2019 BOOK REVIEWS

Two authors you might want to check out in the new year: Belinda Bauer and Naomi Novik. Bauer writes detective-thrillers and has a substantial back list. Her latest is "**Snap**," set in Wales, with the protagonist 14-year-old Jack. His mother has been murdered; his father is distraught to the point of abandoning his three children. Jack figures it's up to him to take care of his little sisters and to avenge his mother's death. His resourcefulness in doing this, while never out-ofcharacter for a teenager, is one of the joys of the novel. There are real detectives involved in the case: thoroughly conventional and uptight DS Reynolds and his slovenly, chain-smoking, fond-

of-booze boss, DCI Marvel. If you like this novel, try Bauer's earlier "**Rubbernecker**," in which the main character has Aspergers.



Naomi Novik writes fantasy. Her long Temeraire series features a 19th century England (and China and Australia) in which battling dragons are a major part of military strategy. Napoleon (who has his own dragons) is the major villain. However, "Spinning Silver," Novik's recent stand-alone fantasy novel, is a highly imaginative re-telling of the fairy tale about a girl ordered to spin straw into gold. Novik changes the gold to silver and invents not one but three young women in desperate circumstances. The pleasure here is the spirited resistance and cleverness of the women, who do not waste time looking around for a Prince Charming, but who prepare to rescue themselves. And do.

If you have a fondness for libraries in general, you will want to read Susan Orlean's non-fiction "**The Library Book.**" It is ostensibly about the horrific fire in 1986 that nearly destroyed the Los Angeles main library, but Orlean also describes the hunt for the arsonist, the history of the library, the problem of the homeless in libraries, library programs and how they evolved, library architecture, and too many more topics to list. The result is a fascinating read.

You may have to order these books--they may not appear on the new-books kiosk. Ask any library staff person to help you.
